

## **Another Chance to Subscribe.**

**A suit has been commenced against the city of New York by the heirs of John or Johannes Vermilya, an old Dutch settler, for the recovery of the whole of that portion of Manhattan island bounded by the North and Harlem rivers, and extending from seventy-fourth street upward. The heirs of Mr. Vermilya found their claims to the property in question on two patents, one of which was given by the British governor, Nichols, in 1667, and the other by Gov. Thomas Dongan in 1686, to John Vermilya and four other patentees, for services rendered the British government in settling and improving then upper portion of Manhattan island. The property is estimated to be worth at this time about two hundred and fifty million dollars. Up to the present date 812 heirs of Mr. Vermilya have registered their claims, but it is believed that a great many more will be found, *as* the name is comparatively common.**
